 Inter municipal agreement between the county, towns and villages to share Auditing Services (Controller):

This would allow towns and villages to use the counties Controller personnel to audit their judicial courts rather than towns and villages contracting out at much higher rates of service.

2. Inter municipal agreement between the county, towns and villages to share Real Property data verification and revaluation services:

This would allow towns and villages to use the counties Real Property personnel to perform data verification and revaluation services at a much lower cost than entering into contracts with outside firms to perform the same tasks at higher rates.

3. Inter municipal agreement between the county, towns and villages to share the County's Time and Attendance Application (Kronos):

This would allow towns and villages to use the counties cloud based Time & Attendance Application at a much lower cost than buying and entering into contracts with outside firms to perform the same tasks at higher costs.

- 4. Columbia County has partnered with Ralph Benefit Advisors to develop collective leverages enrollment and use data analytics to reduce stop loss claims, claims volatility, as well as fixed costs. And with New York State Association of Counties (NYSAC) has formed the NYSAC Municipal Healthcare Financing Collective (MHFC) to lower the cost of stop premiums and pass those savings back to the member's counties (Columbia, Ulster & Yates) in the Collective.
- 5. Inter municipal agreement between the county and fire departments to provide training in classroom and new fire tower facilities.
- 6. Inter municipal agreement between the county, fire departments and towns to provide new mandatory life insurances.
- 7. Inter municipal agreement between the county, towns and villages to share Planning in GIS ((Geographic Information System) implementation:

This would allow towns and villages to use the county's Planning personnel to help implement GIS mapping of property parcels.
