New York State envisions that programs will be administered in accordance with the CSBG statutory purposes and goals and in compliance with all ap plicable state and federal statutes, rules, regulations, policies and procedures. This will include Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, 2020, Public Law 116-36, along with CSBG Information Memorandums 154, 157 and 158. The following goals guide operation to ensure funds are administered to help prevent, prepare for or respond to the coronavirus: Goal 1: Funds will be distributed in a timely manner and in accordance with applicable federal and state statutes. Goal 2: A comprehensive onsite review of each eligible entity will be conducted at least once every three years in accordance with § 678B of the CSBG Act. The reviews will be based in part on the organizational standards in accordance with IM138. Training and technical as sistance will be provided to ensure that grantees can increase compliance with federal organizational standards. DOS has provided updates to the CSBG CARES Act funding starting with the DOS sponsored Executive Directors teleconference held on May 5, 202 0 and a NYSCAA sponsored teleconference held on July 30, 2020. Subsequent updates were provided on May 20, June 9, and June 25, 2020 as part of thr ee NYSCAA Regional Meeting Webinars presented to update the NYS CSBG network on the status of how DOS would be administering CSBG CARES Act funds. Questions from the NYS CSBG network of eligible entities were addressed based on available guidance from OCS. On August 13, 2020, the C SBG CARES Supplemental State Plan was posted to the websites of DOS and NYSCAA. Email blasts were also sent, on August 13, 2020, to key stakeholders seeking review and comment. DOS presented the CSBG CARES Supplemental State Plan to the NYS CSBG Advisory Council on August 18, 2020.

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


