COUNTY OF DUTCHESS Marcus J. Molinaro County Executive

In 2017, with the enactment of the County-Wide Shared Services Initiative law, county executives across the state were mandated to form and lead a panel comprised of all city, town and village executives tasked with creating a county-wide shared services property tax savings plan. With the hard work and dedication of all of our municipalities and participating school districts, Dutchess County submitted a plan for 2018 that identified over \$25.5 million in savings related to 35 projects. These savings targets put Dutchess County in the top five counties in New York State for highest savings reported in the first year, highest savings reported in the outyears, and largest savings per taxpayer, according to the Rockefeller Institute of Government.

Shared services and property tax savings are not new ideas in Dutchess County. The County has always worked hand in hand with our municipalities in an effort to create long-lasting cost savings for our residents. We have reduced the county property tax levy in each of the last six years. Since 2013, our administration and the County Legislature allocated nearly \$11 million through our Municipal Innovation Grant Program to incentivize municipalities to share services, evaluate consolidation opportunities, establish a regional delivery of services, and implement other efficiencies. We have also worked on joint Community Development Block Grant Projects designed to prevent the duplication of efforts.

For 2021, Dutchess County in collaboration with our local municipalities submit the attached plan, which identifies \$133,157 in savings related to the Tri-Municipal Waste Treatment Upgrades and Elimination of Town Sewer Facility and \$249,682 in savings related to a Body Camera System for Sheriff Law Enforcement Officers. We believe this plan creates new opportunities to share services, reduce costs, and improve the services we provide residents.

In addition to the savings identified, the State has promised matching funds, where eligible. This funding will provide further taxpayer relief, and we will continue working with the State to draw down these promised funds.

This plan represents only a small portion of our current efforts to identify efficiencies and reduce the burden on local taxpayers. We will continue to work together as one community, one county, to share services, eliminate duplicated programs, consolidate and provide overall tax savings for the residents of our County, as we have for many years.

Financial Summary

The State requires Counties include a summary of projected savings to the average taxpayer, homeowner and business as part of this plan; however, making these projections outside of each municipalities' budget process, is simply inaccurate and projecting countywide tax savings as a percentage of one's individual property tax bill is impossible. Each homeowner and business are taxed based on their own unique assessed valuation and municipal assessed value, which can change year to year. Although the following County-Wide Shared Services Property Tax Savings Plan Summary document is the prescribed format for submission of the Tax Savings Plan to the Director of the New York State Division of the Budget as required by law, the numbers as presented cannot be accurate.

It is important to note that the State has a critical role in producing meaningful property tax relief. In Dutchess County, nearly 70% of net county costs are for mandated programs and services. The remaining amount is "optional spending," including crucial government functions such as health and mental health services, sheriff road patrols, road repair, snow removal, public transportation, 911 dispatch, and senior services. Dutchess County has been sharing services and containing costs for years, now the State needs to do their share to reduce mandated costs instead of simply blaming others.

Project Name: Tri-Municipal Treatment Upgrades & Elimination of Town Sewer Facility

Municipalities Participating:

Village of Wappingers Falls, Town of Wappinger, and Town of Poughkeepsie

Project Description:

Tri-Municipal Wastewater (WWTP) serves the Towns of Poughkeepsie (POK) and Wappinger (WAPP), and the Village of Wappingers Falls (VWF), or 24.2% of the County. The WWTP wants to add flow from WAPP and eliminate a redundant sewer district. This requires a new digestor, flow splitter and clarifiers for a total of \$2.1 million of work needed at the WWTP to prepare it to take additional flow. It also requires \$6.2 million in work in WAPP to pipe the additional flow through VWF to the WWTP. WAPP has received a \$2.5 million grant from NYS to do this work. The first phase is the digestor which costs \$195,643. Sludge digestion is operated as a batch system and wasted to the digestor until the tank is completely filled. It's then aerated and cycled between the gravity belt thickener and digestor before finally being sent to the belt filter press. To increase efficiency, a continuous feed system would be implemented. Its 4 digestors would be piped to create 2 in-series and 2 tank digestors with continuous aeration, accelerating the process and increasing capacity. This extra capacity of the digestors is necessary to accommodate future increases in the plant permitted capacity and allow the facility to take on additional flow from the municipalities as well as the County Airport. Utilizing the WWTP with a direct discharge to the Hudson River will remove the nutrient loading from Wappinger Creek and Lake both of which contain elevated levels of nutrients causing algae during the summer.

Savings Methodology: Plant staff is currently being paid roughly \$70 per hour/week. Operators claim it currently takes 80 hours per week to process sludge from digestor to composting. With an estimated 25% (20 hours) reduction in process time, \$70 per hour x 80 hours per week x .25 x 52 weeks = \$72,800 saved per year.

Labor costs alone will decrease from \$291,000 annually to \$218,200 annually. This methodology does not include the unforeseen upkeep problems that our current outdated plants are beginning to face.

It is anticipated that the remaining time would be used for other proactive projects which would address the plant's continued commitment to responsibly overseeing how to address the sewer needs for its constituents.

Project Description:

In response to Executive Order No. 203, Dutchess County formed a collaborative to enact necessary and needed police reforms. An early recommendation of the group, was to require law enforcement officers to utilize body worn cameras. It was the belief of the group that the cameras would improve accountability, transparency, and the quality of community interactions. The County and the Sheriff's Office as well as other local agencies have been taking early steps to evaluate purchasing and requiring the use of body cameras for officers. To aid in this effort and reduce overall costs, a joint purchase of cameras as well as shared data storage is being pursued.
