

## CHART 1 - MEDICAL ELIGIBILITY FOR LICENSURE

Required Test	Additional Information
<p><b>Brain MRI Scan with a 1.5 or greater Tesla Magnet. Required MRI Sequence(s):</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Susceptibility weighted imaging (SWI);</li> <li>• T1 weighted images;</li> <li>• T2 weighted images;</li> <li>• FLAIR;</li> <li>• Diffusion weighted image (DWI);</li> <li>• Gradient echo (GRE)</li> </ul>	<p>Every three (3) years or as required by NYSAC Chief Medical Officer.</p>
<p><b>Electrocardiogram (EKG):</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 12 Lead</li> </ul>	<p>Every twelve (12) months or as required by NYSAC Chief Medical Officer. Not more than one year (365 days) prior to any contest or exhibition.</p>
<p><b>Dilated eye examination:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• By a licensed ophthalmologist (Must be an MD or a DO)</li> </ul>	<p>Every twelve (12) months or as required by NYSAC Chief Medical Officer. Not more than one year (365 days) prior to any contest or exhibition.</p>
<p><b>Blood testing:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• HIV serology</li> <li>• Hepatitis B – surface antigen</li> <li>• Hepatitis C – antibody</li> <li>• CBC with platelet count</li> <li>• Pregnancy test (*women only)</li> </ul>	<p>Every twelve (12) months or as required by NYSAC Chief Medical Officer. Not more than one year (365 days) prior to any contest or exhibition. *Pregnancy test must be conducted not more than thirty days (30) prior to any contest or exhibition.</p>
<p><b>Urine testing:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Urine samples for illegal drugs</li> </ul>	<p>See below</p>
<p><b>Physical:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Conducted by NYSAC Panel Physician.</li> </ul>	<p>See below</p>

- All of these tests must be approved by the CMO/ACMO prior to final medical clearance of the applicant.
- In the event that a test result is abnormal the candidate may need to undergo additional medical assessments/clearances.
- Special guidelines are in place when considering the “high risk” combatant (see above)
- When considering candidates who submit medical evaluations written in a language other than English, special guidelines exist to ensure that this information is translated appropriately and is not misconstrued.
