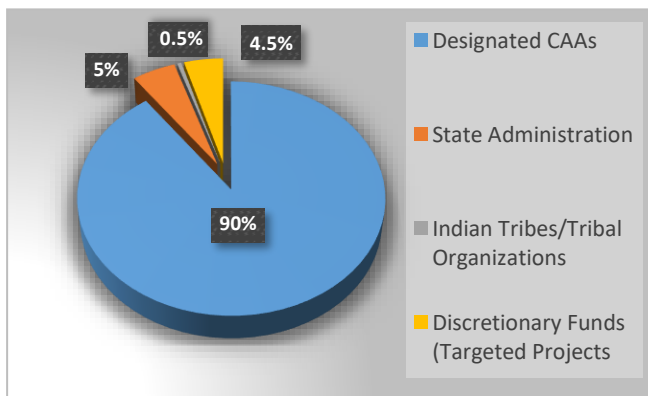
## **INTRODUCTION**

In compliance with § 159-n of the Executive Law, the New York State Department of State (DOS) respectfully submits this annual report regarding the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program. As the CSBG administering agency for New York State, DOS, by and through its Division of Community Services (DCS) establishes goals and objectives to guide program evaluation, monitoring, and oversight.

This report summarizes the accomplishments of the CSBG network, and the actions taken to facilitate and monitor the work of CSBG providers throughout Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2020, which commenced on October 1, 2019 and concluded on September 30, 2020. When reviewing this report, please keep in mind that as a Federally funded block grant, the CSBG program operates based on a federal fiscal year (October 1-September 30). Additionally, the service outcome data reported within this report is from FFY 2019, as the CSBG program reports final outcome data on a one-year lag to allow for data gathering, review, and accuracy.

## **DISTRIBUTION OF CSBG FUNDING FFY 2020**

The Federal CSBG Act requires New York State to distribute at least 90% (\$57,589,759) of its annual \$63,988,621 federal allocation of CSBG funding directly to designated Community Action Agencies (“CAAs”) in specific pre-determined proportionate share amounts (see 42 USC § 9907). Five percent (\$3,199,431) of New York’s Federal CSBG allocation may be used for the State’s administration of the program.



Of the remaining funds from the FFY 2020 CSBG allocation, 4.5% (\$2,879,488) was used to support innovative initiatives in workforce development, provide vital services for low income new Americans, establish pilot projects to reunify citizens re-entering the community from incarceration, and deliver important trainings and technical assistance throughout the CAA network.

Finally, one-half of one percent (\$319,943) of New York’s annual CSBG funding was provided to two Native American tribes and organizations, as required by New York State Executive Law § 159-i.

## **DISCRETIONARY FUNDING FOR COVID RESPONSE**

In March 2020, DCS made available up to \$50,000 in CSBG discretionary funds to private New York State Community Action Agencies for COVID-19 Pandemic related services, 2020 Census Hard-to-Count assistance, and/or Back-to-School related readiness. These funds were fully distributed and expended by September 30, 2020. In total, \$2,060,921.00 in discretionary funding was distributed to participating CSBG grantees. This funding increased the financial liquidity of agencies facing financial shortfalls and allowed them to address areas of need hit especially hard by the COVID-19 Pandemic.

## **DISTRIBUTION OF CARES FUNDING**

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act of 2020 authorized the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services’ Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) program to provide COVID-19 related assistance to New Yorkers. The CARES Act provided \$86,780,939 to New York State, 90% (\$78,102,845) of which was allocated directly to designated Community Action Agencies (“CAAs”) in specific proportionate share amounts (see 42 USC § 9907). Five percent (\$4,339,047) of New York’s Federal CSBG allocation may be used

for the State’s administration of the program. Finally, \$433,905 of CARES Act funding was made available to three Native American tribes and tribal organizations as required by New York State Executive Law § 159-i.

## **THE CSBG NETWORK: PROGRAM AND FISCAL OVERSIGHT**

Routine monitoring of all CSBG-funded entities is conducted by DOS staff. **Table 1** provides a snapshot of the monitoring activities conducted by DOS in association with quarterly virtual and on-site visits to CAAs and other CSBG-funded grantees during FFY 2020. These activities include attendance at board meetings, review of board related documents, program and fiscal monitoring, and assistance in the development of work plans and required reports.

Federal law requires New York State to conduct one full on-site review of each designated CAA at least once every three years (see 42 USC § 9914). For this purpose, DCS developed the Triennial Review and Assessment for Compliance with Standards (TRACS) tool. Based in part on the Federal organizational standards, this triennial review process focuses on the areas of planning, community partnerships and involvement, governance and organizational leadership, personnel administration, fiscal and internal controls, as well as data collection and reporting. Included within the review are written recommendations intended to promote feedback and continuous quality improvement. All DCS recommendations made during the TRACS are ultimately consolidated into a Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP) developed by DCS and the subject CAA.

For FFY 2020, the NYS Division of Community Services implemented a new risk assessment tool for CSBG eligible entities. This tool allowed DCS to streamline monitoring and offer more assistance to agencies most in need. A major focus for technical assistance in FFY 2020 continued to be compliance with national standards instituted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) established in 2016.

DOS offers all CSBG-funded entities opportunities for training and technical assistance (T/TA). Technical assistance needs are often identified during the contracting process, monitoring reviews, or during a triennial assessment. In addition to the training and technical assistance provided directly by DOS staff, grantees are offered T/TA through the State’s contract with the New York State Community Action Association (NYSCAA). This year, NYSCAA focused on training in the Uniform Guidance and provided technical assistance as needed. A highlight of these trainings was the ROMA (Results Oriented Management and Accountability) Alliance Partnership which focused on using the ROMA framework. The purpose of the New York Alliance is to bring together ROMA professionals to develop a culture in Community Action Agencies that supports and contributes to results orientation. This program supports a significant push from HHS to address and understand the data needs and the use of data for analysis/continual improvement of outcomes tied to the use of CSBG funds.

Continuous T/TA efforts are strengthened through quarterly calls with agency Executive Directors. These calls have allowed DOS staff to better assess the needs of the community action agencies and offer direct support where needed.

In March 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act temporarily allowed states to revise to 200% of the FPL. Therefore, currently, CSBG grantees are eligible to extend service to families under the 200% FPL. Although final data is not yet available, this increase is anticipated to assist with the rising number of individuals and families affected by unemployment due to COVID-19. The revised income eligibility limits are set to expire September 30, 2021, pursuant to federal law, at which time the income eligibility limit is anticipated to return to 125% of the FPL.

## **REPORTING PERFORMANCE OUTCOMES**

The community action network continues to work diligently to improve the lives of our State’s most vulnerable residents. Through a core network of 48 designated CAAs, a range of services are provided to meet the needs of low-income New Yorkers in all of New York’s 62 counties.

The CSBG Annual Report is a data reporting system, administered by the National Association for State Community Services Programs (NASCS) and supported by the HHS Office of Community Services (OCS). This collection system emphasizes reporting performance outcomes that demonstrate the strength of the CSBG network on a national level. The data reported for FFY 2019 now includes the number of individuals served, along with those that achieved significant outcomes in each domain. Following its implementation in 2017, the HHS mandated data collection process has reduced the number of occurrences in which an individual might have been counted more than once in any given service year. Consistency of data collection accounts for the decrease in the number of individuals served between FFY 2018 and FFY 2019 (see table below). NASCS has indicated that FFY 2019 statistics currently reported may be revised upward to include additional Community Action Agency counts (see chart below).

In 2019, the NYS CSBG network provided services to 520,836 low-income individuals. Of these, 301,660 were children, 22,647 were seniors, and 40,671 were people with disabilities. Table 2 below presents the New York network’s key performance outcomes as reported in FFY 2018 (October 1, 2017, through September 30, 2018) and FFY 2019 (October 1, 2018, through September 30, 2019) (most current reported statistics), sorted by federally required categorical indicators of movement toward self-sufficiency and community revitalization. The statistics for FFY 2020 (October 1, 2019, through September 30, 2020) are expected to be available in late April 2021.
